Dear Mazenod Community,

While a slightly shorter week it was certainly filled with many important events and some sadness.

As I am sure, many of you may be aware that during sport on Tuesday afternoon, a Year 9 Student suffered a medical incident, most likely caused by a pre-existing condition. The Nurses and Teaching Staff provided initial first aid, including using one of the College's defibrillator, until Paramedics arrived. I am extremely proud of the prompt action and care taken by Staff. It was not an easy situation but was certainly dealt with promptly and professionally. Paramedics and hospital staff are in praise of their actions.

The student was transferred to Monash Hospital by ambulance. Mr. Finnigan (Dean of Junior School), Ms Skourides (Year 9 Co-ordinator) and I were with the family throughout the evening at the hospital. On Thursday while visiting, I received the positive news that Chris had been taken out of an induced coma with many positive signs; he is breathing for himself, opening his eyes and responding to commands. Doctors and Nurses seemed very positive, however he continues to undergo tests and has a challenging road ahead. Our prayers and thoughts are with Chris and his family at this difficult time.

As the incident occurred around 2:45 p.m. and a number of ambulances and the fire brigade were on the property while school was finishing, I was very proud of all of the students for working with staff to ensure the quadrangle was kept clear during this time. We must be very thankful that we have nurses, trained first aid staff, and access to a medical system like we have here in Australia.

This is a good reminder that your co-operation as parents is vital in providing up to date medical information about your son. Communication between the school and parents is very important, and we ask that you take the time to read what is provided for you. Should you wish to update any information or discuss any medical issues, please contact the Health Centre. We have encouraged students who witnessed the incident or were involved to talk to a staff member, your Homeroom Teacher, an Oblate or one of the Counselling Staff. Please keep Chris and his family in your prayers over the coming week.

On Wednesday evening the College hosted the Year 7 Information Night which was well attended despite the very warm evening. Parents were provided with an introduction to the Elevate Study Skills Program, which has been rolled out throughout the school, an update on the Laptop Program and an introduction to the Parents Associations.

The Ladies' Auxiliary and Fathers' Association are important parts of the College Community. The 50th Anniversary vision and aim is to increase the connectedness within our community. In recent times some matters have been raised in the Associations which have directly influenced a decision that has been made. There will be a special Welcome Evening on 27th April to greet new parents. It is important to meet new parents and a great chance to get to know all parents of the College. It will also be an opportunity to come and look first hand at the plans for the new construction.

At the Inaugural Mass we welcomed the students of 1967/68, I must admit it required a little push and encouragement to get them there, but I am sure as you witnessed it was an amazing opportunity and time for all of them to be together.

A splash of green on today for Saint Patrick's Day is a great reminder that it is possible to mix faith with a little fun. Saint Patrick is the patron Saint of the Archdiocese of Melbourne and certainly is a significant figure of faith in the foundation of the faith in Australia.

"Saint Patrick was a Roman Britain-born Christian Missionary and is the patron Saint of Ireland along with Brigid of Kildare and Columba. When he was about sixteen, he was captured by Irish raiders and taken as a slave to Ireland, where he lived for six years before escaping and returning to his family.

He entered the church, as his father and grandfather had before him, becoming a Deacon and a Bishop. He later returned to Ireland as a Missionary in the North and West of the island, but little is known about the places where he worked, and no link can be made between Patrick and any church. By the 8th Century, he had become the patron Saint of Ireland. The Irish monastery system evolved after the time of Patrick, and the Irish church did not develop the diocesan model that Patrick and the other early missionaries had tried to establish." A group of Year 9 students attended the Annual St Patrick's Mass at the Cathedral to mark the patron of the diocese and our students who attended participated in a special way as one of the Colleges celebrating an important milestone.

As most would know, Ministerial Order 870, which was passed in 2016, mandated practices that institutions, such as schools, had to implement in order to ensure child safety. At Mazenod, we, like all schools, changed processes so that we complied with the recommendations and expectations outlined by the Government. Since last year we have reviewed all our policies in order to, not only conform to the standards, but to create an environment where all are safe. Volunteers, contractors and all employees at Mazenod are expected to comply with the College's Code of Conduct, are to have, or be in the process of gaining a Working with Children's Check and to have access to our Child Safe Policy. Parents working in the Canteen, assisting with the Musical or volunteering with our Family Fun Day would be aware of this and have willingly followed the expectations that have been set.

While some may feel that these processes are an inconvenience, Mazenod takes Child Safety seriously and has implemented many measures to ensure that those who generously assist the College can meet the requirements in a time effective and easy manner. A website has been created that contains Mazenod's Policies and links to government sites where applications for Working with Children's Checks can be downloaded. There is also a video that outlines why these laws have been initiated, and in future it will become mandatory viewing if people wish to work with our children or assist at school.

The effects of this Ministerial Order doesn't stop at the gates of our school. If a family billets a student from one of our sister Colleges, or from a College overseas, then all adults from that household (i.e. any person over the age of 18) will be required to have a Working with Children's Check. While this may seem like overkill, it ensures the safety of our young men.

With events such as the 50th Anniversary Music Concert coming up Parents will be asked to billet students from Iona College in Queensland and Mazenod, Western Australia. It is important that the effects of the Child Safe Policy doesn't deter families from supporting the activities that we offer at the College. The implications of sharing our homes with students from other Oblate schools is more than just providing a roof over their heads. Friendships flourish, cultures of our different schools are shared and the realisation that students are a part of a greater sphere of Oblate education is invaluable.

Once the Mazenod College Child Safe web page has been finalised the link will be publicised to the wider community. Please ensure that you take the time to see how we, at Mazenod, are continually improving the procedures we have, to ensure that we can provide the safest environment possible for our young men. We do take child safety seriously, and regularly inform our students of the strategies available to report any instances where they feel unsafe.

HUMANITIES

Elevate skills get the thumbs up

Students are rarely eager to do extra work but Humanities students have endorsed regular note taking as an addition to daily tasks. Mazenod has invested in the Elevate company who enthusiastically preached practical methods lifting grades. For Year 10s, Elevate emphasised systematic note taking, independent learning activity and the use of concept maps.

Year 10 History students were given a document breaking the course into focus questions, content headings and sub headings. Then the Elevate methodology was reinforced focusing on brevity, layout and the use of trigger words. Students were then required, in their own time, to write structured notes as the course progressed.

Students have recently completed two units and assessment. They were surveyed on their attitude towards the consistent note taking. The figures below indicate a very positive attitude.

Students were asked to write one comment, positive or negative, on any aspect of the note taking thus far. All but one were positive. Here are two samples:

- Note taking helped me to organise the material I learnt and it made it easier for me to recap on what I had learnt in the past
- Notes provide for an easy way to organise your thoughts and recall your notes for exams.

Years 7 and 10 students have no History text using only the laptop. The benefits so far are

- The chance to have a 1 minute flyover of the Versailles Palace is more engaging than a talk from a tourist/teacher
- Students use team work and google docs when researching precise details on the various factors on Hitler's ascent to power.
- The analysis of contemporary newspaper cartoons is made easier by inking items on the screen, listening and re listening (in their own time) to a staff prepared video on analysis methods.
- Students individually watch and listen to an eye witness account of an American in Nazi German pre-war brings to life their experience
- Students instantly have their device to use when previously they wasted time retrieving them from receptacles outside the class
- \$70 textbooks replaced with a \$20 levy in Year 7 and no additional cost in Year 10
- Use of google docs and set folders means a greater chance of a well organised student at exam time.

CAREERS IN HEALTH

Healthcare and social assistance - which includes doctors, nurses, dentists, physiotherapists, childcare workers and aged care providers - has made the largest contribution to the nation's jobs growth over the past 15 years. It now employs more than 1.5 million people, or one in every eight Australian workers, accounting for 13% of Australia's workforce. It's also a well-educated sector - about three-quarters of its workers hold a post-school qualification, which is well above the national average. Over the five years to November 2015, employment grew by 20.3% (or 256,600). New jobs were created in all subsectors, but most were in Medical and Other Health Care Services (up by 142,100) with Social Assistance Services also adding a significant number (75,800). Around 250,200 more jobs are expected over the five years to November 2020 (up by 16.4%).

Nearly four in five workers in Health Care and Social Assistance have completed post-school study. While a large proportion holds a bachelor degree or higher qualification (44%), vocational education and training (VET) qualifications are also a significant pathway to employment.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works and sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF will be provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- \$125 for primary school students
- \$225 for secondary school students.
