Dear Parents,

We are all aware of the Reality TV phenomenon where producers are trying to create relevance for the viewer, hence programme after programme of what we eat, how we shelter and how we relate. Many are dubious about the authenticity of the "real life" creations but it is true, many people appreciate "the connect" with these productions.

At the moment many of our students are experiencing Reality Education. The tradition of work experience is becoming a logistical nightmare as businesses and the College wrestle with their OHS responsibilities, but the experience is invaluable for our Year 10 students. They are enlightened to the responsibilities associated with the work place in general and are often exhausted as they cope with rigours of the respective jobs. Teachers visit the students and in the vast majority of cases the reports are that the students are doing a brilliant job. What is also evident is the genuine care and generosity of the various employers and supervisors that are providing such a worthwhile experience to the boys. We are very grateful to the many businesses who provide an opportunity for our students and Ms Vivian Seremetis who puts the programme together.

The Year 11 students are completing Business Week. The company simulation, the company reports, the displays and the establishment of their own business requires teamwork and critical decision making. It is a week of frenetic and chaotic decision making that hopefully gives an insight into the business world. Thanks to Ms Prue McLeod and Ms Kaye Williamson, Commerce Department, and many other teachers who manage this experience for the boys.

Twenty seven Year 11 students attended a Retreat organised by Mr Stephen Lawrence and Ms Joanne Caird. Several ex-students also attended in mentoring roles. The week culminated in an experience and appreciation of the Mission and Service to those who are homeless. Staff have been donating warm gloves, socks and scarves over recent weeks and the students took these with them on their "street meetings". The students appreciated that the most significant thing they had to offer was their recognition and time - time to know names, share stories, listen and sit around.

Another group of students are appreciating first-hand the reality of the Oblate Mission Work in Hong Kong, China. Fr Fini, Ms Arlette Pat and Mr David Munro are accompanying the group of students. The immersion programmes are a stunning way to appreciate the remarkable work of the Missions and the Oblate Fathers. For many years now we have supported a couple of students from the Oblate school in Hong Kong to visit Mazenod. They will be here for the first three weeks of Term 3.

Finally I would like to congratulate the Senior Soccer Team for their 5-1 win on Wednesday at the ACC Final. The Seconds Soccer also made their final but were beaten by St Bernards, 5-3. The Senior cohort has dominated the competition, winning the title six years in a row, from Year 7 through to Year 12. An amazing accomplishment and a credit to the talents of the players and the management of the team under Mr Emilio Montoya's guidance.

## The Mid Year Turning Point

The American philosopher and 20th Century educational reformer, John Dewey (1859-1952) once wrote:

"Greater emphasis should be placed on the broadening of the intellect and the development of problem solving and critical thinking skills, rather than the memorisation of lessons."

Dewey's view on education was regarded as progressive at the time but would be accepted universally today. We aim to broaden our intellect not only by acquiring knowledge but by the appreciation of the arts. We endeavour to think critically and make sound judgements rather than just memorise answers. We seek to acquire values and standards that are freely embraced than imposed. These are our aspirations. This reminds me that we remember our teachers, not necessarily the individual lessons.

Of course we make mistakes along the way, the trick is not to keep making the same ones. When things go wrong, it becomes an even bigger mistake to blame others or spend too much time in remorse. It is far more sensible to learn from our mistakes and get on with striving to become better. I appreciate the analogy that the windscreen is much larger than the rear vision mirror in a car so as to look forward and not waste time dwelling on the past.

The middle of the year for a Senior student at Mazenod marks many significant turning points unique to each year level.

Year 10 students, with exams now behind them, this week participated in Work Experience where they had the opportunity to taste the realities of working in an adult environment. The placement of work experience is a lead in to the selection of senior school certificates VCE or VCAL and subjects and courses within each of these pathways. All of sudden things start to become serious for our young men with important decisions to be made.

Year 11 students have had the usual end of semester assessments and formal exams concluding Unit 1 courses. By now the effective study habits and work ethic need to be established to enable a springboard into Year 12. Changes of subjects and honest reflection takes place to make sure the right mindset to tackle the remaining 18 months of Secondary schooling is in place.

Year 12 students face the reality of only 60 days of teaching time left. With Unit 3 out of the way the hard slog through the winter months continues, necessary to complete the remaining course work, competencies and the all-important final exams. The task of deciding on preferred courses, training and future employment becomes a priority with VTAC applications and the many associated deadlines for paperwork, folios and interviews required during Term 3.



Yes 6 ACC Soccer Titles in a row!
